"Impact, Opportunities, and Challenges for Open Government: Creating and Implementing Co-Creation Commitments"

A propose was made to the Organizing Committee of the 2019 Global Summit of the OGP for the inclusion in the agenda of a panel focused on co-creation.

This panel proposition has been accepted under the impact thematic which implies that the panel must be designed with the goal of building strategies to help citizens understand how open government affects their day-to-day lives, and governments focus on outcomes.

The details of the panel are as follows:

Title	Impact, Opportunities, and Challenges for Open Government: Creating and Implementing Co-Creation Commitments		
Format	 Panel: Dynamic, high-level, facilitated conversations with up to 5 experts or practitioners, including government officials, civil society members, and representatives from other sectors. The panel will be in English. We'll have a trilingual room (English, Spanish and French) – Room 210 Theme: Impact 		
Objectives	 The panel will provide a space for participants from various sectors and regions to reflect on their experience of implementing open government (national and subnational level) and to provide tools to do it successfully. Questions to be addressed include: In your experience, which approach of open government has been more successful, one with national scope or one with regional/subnational? How does geography affects the impact results of open government initiatives? What are the main conditions that promote the co-creation effectiveness? How is co-creation being adapted and build on the ground and practice of the OGP Subnational Pilot? This session aims to improve the involvement and the responsiveness of public institutions and citizen participation in national and subnational governments through the understanding of the influence of the local context, problem-solving based on local contexts and the various jurisdictions in the open government making. After the summit, this session will produce a post-panel review, meeting notes/brochure from the panel on social media, attendees feedback, and call to action.

stakeholder forum. Founder and researcher of the Research Group in Government, Administration and Public Policies (GIGAPP), professor at the Institute of Public Affairs (INAP) of the University of Chile and President of the Multitudes Foundation.



5. Joel Salas Suárez, Commisioner at INAI Mexico

He has a degree in International Trade from the Institute of Higher Studies of the West (ITESO), a master's degree in Political Science from the Institute of Higher Studies in Latin America (IHEAL) and a Ph.D. in Political Science from the School of Advanced Studies in Social Sciences of the University of Paris III-Sorbonne Nouvelle. He served as head of the Transparency and International Cooperation Policy Unit of the

Ministry of Public Administration as a specialist in open government issues. His academic and professional experience has focused on the development and implementation of strategies and policies of transparency and combating corruption; implementation of policies on good governance and public ethics; as well as the analysis of social movements and democratization in Mexico. He is currently commissioner of the INAI and coordinates the commissions on Access to Information Policies and Open Government and Transparency.

6. Kristina Reinsalu, Electronic governance academy, Civil society, Estonia



She has extensive experience in working with local authorities and their communities in Estonia, in Europe and beyond its borders assisting them on how to interact with citizens, how to engage citizens in decision-making processes with particular focus on digital tools enabling these processes. She has designed, delivered and coordinated several successful local and international projects on implementation of OGP methodology at local level, focusing in particular on e-services and e-

participation; Many of them have had a clear and sound impact and have laid the foundation for new governing practices or even policies.

About some of the cases that will be showcased in the panel, the INAI will present its initiative called *Open Government: locally driven co-creation* where the local efforts related to open government in 28 states of the country will be mentioned¹. In the rest of the cases, each panelist will present and talk about some cases related to local co-creation; however, the final topics are yet to be defined by each panelist.

First intervention by the moderator: Welcome message, presentation of speakers, panel dynamic, opening statement and controversial question.

Second intervention by the moderator: The moderator highlights some of the audience responses to her initial questions and takes 3-5 questions from the audience for the speakers to answer

The moderator should use the web app² for live interactions since the beginning of the panel. When mentioning the dynamics, the moderator should mention the existence of initial questions (2-3) on the app that the audience are invited to answer. Additionally, the moderator should remember the audience there's the possibility for them to submit their questions to the speakers through the app and vote for those who they think are most relevant.
